For me though, its real claim to fame is that it was visited several times by Paul on his preaching journeys; he founded the church here. I was adopted by one of the women from the church, and she who taught me about Jesus. I dedicated my life to Jesus, vowing never to marry. Little did I know where this would eventually lead.

My life at Antioch will soon be over, because I am sure that I will soon be killed - like so many Christians before me. By refusing to marry the Roman governor, and refusing to renounce being a Christian, he has put me on trial and had me tortured. I am not sure how I have endured it, but through all the pain and troubles though I have felt Jesus with me. And I know that what I am going through is nothing compared to what he suffered – suffered for me, and everyone else. He died taking my sin onto himself.
