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Pastoral Letter - from Ruth Edy

On 6th January, I 'de-frocked' the Christmas tree, (it was the perfect shape and height and had come from Geoff and Carol's wood on the Whiteway!) and lovingly wrapped up again the olive wood nativity set which I bought in Bethlehem in 1999 (I'm still using its original box and packaging!). These January rituals are almost as nostalgic as the Advent rituals when Christmas begins to happen. A few days later, while reading about the Festival of Candlemas which is at the beginning of February, I found out that in some countries and in some traditions, Christmas decorations aren't taken down until 2nd February. Ah, I could have had the tree and the nativity scene on display for a bit longer!

But I do still have in place a sort-of home-made Advent calendar, well, not home-made so much as pick-your-own! I bought it one year at Dobbie's garden-centre in one of those after-Christmas sales. [note to self: look out for some more good offers!]. It has 24 pockets for you to fill as you wish and, when I hang it up, I find the little bits of paper I put in the pockets in previous years. Confession - I didn't look at all the pockets through the days of Advent this year, so it's nice to have it to dip into now. Today, I looked in pocket number 10. The little bit of paper had the words - 'Hope has a name...'



I guess that must have been the experience of the elderly priest, Simeon, and Anna - the prophetess, who both encountered Jesus as a baby in the Temple at Jerusalem, when his parents brought him there for the Jewish purification rites (see Luke 2. 21 - 40). As well as the Feast of Candlemas, this special day is also called The Feast of the Holy Encounter. Simeon and Anna had been waiting and waiting all their lives for God's salvation to appear, and now their hopes had been realised - Hope has a name - Jesus.

Early in his ministry Jesus said, 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.' [Luke 4. 18 - 19] I haven't done new year's resolutions for a number of years now: instead, I try to find a phrase I can carry with me through the year. It's a whole lot more manageable and comfortable!

This will be my mot juste for 2022: 'Hope has a name....'

News from around the Benefice

Coberley: Lady Chapel restoration work completed

Restoring the Monument Wall in St Giles, Coberley



The monument wall in St Giles needed urgent repair work. Water had penetrated the wall and soaked into the lime plaster. As a result, the plaster had become unstable, blistered, and large portions had begun to fall away. The first action was to identify where the rainwater was penetrating the external wall. After careful inspection by the churchwarden, it was discovered that the rain gutters and down pipes were totally blocked. So the cast iron rainwater pipes were carefully removed and cleared of years of built-up silt.

Consultation with the Diocese of Gloucester then followed - a necessity when working on a listed building. The appropriate faculty application was made, and all conditions of the certification followed. One condition of the faculty was to have a comprehensive inspection and report from our architect, Mr Middleton (*NickJoyce Limited*). He inspected the monument wall and identified an area of concern which PCC member Mrs Mary Hayward advised the churchwarden about.

A local stonemason, Mr Ian Bishops, completed the specialist work on the external roofing area between the church main area and chapel in June 2021. The area was then monitored regularly to ensure the work undertaken had resolved the problem of water seeping into the chapel.



A further inspection was then required to ascertain the composition of the paint pigment on the monument wall. In the month of May, Mr Bryan Roe *"Keim Mineral Paints Limited"* visited St Giles church and from his inspection produced a comprehensive report, which was acted upon.

With all the administrative paperwork in place, and all contractors engaged; work on the monument wall was started in November by *Carrington Lime Limited*. Scaffolding was erected and closely monitored by Ben in accordance with the recommendations mandated in the architect's report.



With the scaffolding in place, work on the removal of the loose lime plaster started. As much of the original lime plaster that was found to be in good condition was retained as recommended.



With the removal of the defective plaster, work then proceeded on applying two layers of lime plaster to the area. This was completed in early December. However, a period of (28) days was then needed to allow the new lime plaster to cure and dry out naturally. The application of a Fix Additive and two coats of paint was scheduled to start on 7th January. Our contractor, Mr Keith Elliott, was able to complete the painting of the monument wall and attended to the area in the mid-section of the chapel on 11th January.

Latest from Rendcomb - Ruth Edy


Rendcomb College finished the autumn term with the usual parties, visits to the pantomime and the Infants' nativity play. The carol services took place as well but in different circumstances. The Junior School had their Carol Service in the parish church but with no congregation: the service was filmed for the parents as it was decided that was the most sensible option.

The senior school had their Carol Service in Cirencester Parish Church, albeit in a slightly different format. The service was recorded on Monday December 13th, with the use of the parish church's live-streaming software, cameras and microphones. A small number of Sixth Form leavers' families were in attendance, this being their last opportunity to experience a Rendcomb College Carol Service. Tributes to former Stratton School Head from his colleagues at Stratton School

Heartfelt tributes have been paid over the festive period to Mr Mike Hughes, former headteacher of Stratton School.

Mike, who was head at Stratton for over 20 years, sadly passed away in December. Local people, including former colleagues, parents, and pupils, shared fond memories of the longstanding head who prided himself on knowing each child's name and family.



Mike retired from Stratton School in 2014.

Before coming to Stratton, he worked as a teacher at a number of schools in Gloucester and the Forest of Dean.

During his years at Stratton, he was well known for his assembly stories, which were often hugely entertaining but always had a moral. Many former pupils have happy memories of visits to the school by Mike's dog Penny. Mike also introduced residential visits from Stratton School to Biblins, Viney Hill and London and these are fondly remembered by those who took part.

His main ambition after retirement was to cycle across America, which he proudly achieved!

The funeral took place in Gloucester on December 29th and was attended by family, friends, former colleagues, parents and pupils.

Articles on Cowley and Coberley continued

Online studies of the history of Coberley and Cowley: Part 5 By Alan Jordan

To follow is the fifth excerpt from Alan Jordan's online research findings about the history of Coberley and Cowley, which he conducted during the Covid lockdown of early 2021.

[The key sources he used included: the national censuses, which took place every ten years from 1841 to 1911, and the mini-census made in September 1939; Coberley parish records of births, marriages and death; Gloucestershire electoral registers; British History Online and Coberley Tourist Information.]

Coberley Mill

Coberley Mill, a corn-mill southwest of the church, had possibly been established by the late 17th century and was let with a bakehouse by the late 19th century. It stopped working in the 1930s and the building was converted to domestic use^{xivi}. Censuses show that it was run by the **Wilson family**^{xivii} - first William, then his widow Mary and finally by his son William.

In the 1891 census the family consisted of William senior (born in Brimpsfield in 1843) described as "miller/baker", his wife Mary (born in Gloucester in 1848), and their children - Mary (1871, Brimpsfield), Frederick (1872, Brimpsfield), Annie (1874, Brimpsfield), William (1876, Brimpsfield), Elizabeth (1884, Coberley) and Emily (1886, Coberley). The younger Mary was described as "miller and baker's bookkeeper", Frederick as "baker", Annie as "schoolteacher" and William as "baker's assistant". Elizabeth and Emily were still at school. William senior died in 1898, aged 55. The younger William Wilson moved away from Coberley. He was in Cardiff in 1901 and in Charlton Kings in 1911. He described himself as "flour mill delivery man" in 1901 and as "miller and baker" in 1911. He returned to Coberley Mill after his mother's death in 1915 and was there until at least 1927^{xiviii}.

The two photographs below^{xlix} show the mill during William Wilson's tenure and then later when it was a private house. Actual dates of the photographs are not known, but the second picture bears the note "Approx 2003. The Mill has since suffered flooding and was being refurbished [in] 2013".





In the September 1939 Register Coberley Mill was occupied by Richard Hugh **Barlow**, who described himself as *"Flight*" Lieutenant retired and Civil air pilot", and his wife Rosamund S Barlow. Sir Richard Hugh Barlow was born in 1904, the son of Sir Hilaro William Wellesley Barlow. He married Rosamund Sylvia de la Fontaine Anderton in December 1928. He gained the rank of Wing Commander in the Royal Air Force. He fought in the Second World War and was awarded the Air Force Cross. He succeeded as the 6th Baronet Barlow, of Fort William, Bengal in October 1941. He was killed in a plane crash in December 1946, near Quito, Ecuador, aged 42^{\prime} .



The Newspaper extract above right records the tragic news.^{li}

From at least October 1939 to 1956 Coberley Mill was occupied by **William Ellis Barrington-Browne** and his wife Cecilia Muriel Hargreaves Barrington-Browne^{lii}, née Elwes. The name Elwes was also the name of Amelia Maria, the first wife of the Revd William Hicks. William Ellis Barrington-Browne was a well-known artist. He was born in December 1908 and died in Cirencester in 1985.

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Cowley School and Post Office

The School

The first reference to a school in Cowley in censuses and electoral registers was in the 1881 census when **Sarah Nicholls**, aged 23 and born in Devon, was there. There is no mention of a school in the 1891 census.

In the 1901 census, **Mary Harrison**, aged 58 and born in Manchester, was there. She described herself as an '*Elementary School Teacher*'. She was still living in the School House in 1911, when she described herself as *"retired schoolmistress, elementary school"*. Also living there were the Head Teacher **Decima Frances Triese**, aged 29 and born in St Ives - Cornwall, and an assistant teacher **Mary Dorothea Klein**, aged 26, born in Coverham, Yorkshire.

The occupants of the School House from 1918 onwards^{xxx} appear not to be connected to the school. One was a baker and one a gardener. It is not known when the school ceased to function.

The Post Office


The first reference to a Post Office in Cowley in censuses and electoral registers was in the 1901 census when **George Plumbe**, born in Wiltshire in 1853, was there as "*sub-postmaster and garden labourer*". His wife Ann had taken over as sub-postmaster by 1911^{xxxi} and remained so until 1921^{xxxii}. George Plumbe died in 1915.

The next incumbent at the Post Office was **Ernest Charles Stanbridge**, born in 1898. In 1919 he had married Hilda Jessie Plumbe, born in 1893, one of George Plumbe's daughters. Their marriage certificate describes George Plumbe as "deceased" with an occupation of postmaster. Ernest Charles Stanbridge, who was described as a soldier at the time of his marriage, remained at the Post Office until 1923.

From 1924 to 1926 **Archibald Steven Leach**, born in 1885 in Cowley, lived at the Post Office with his wife Frances Mary Leach. They stayed in Cowley after that, and in the 1939 Register Archibald Steven Leach was a central heating boiler attendant at Cowley Manor.

From 1927 to at least 1946^{xxxiii} **Jesse Sly**, born in 1893 in Cowley, and his wife Lizzie, also born in 1893, occupied the Post Office. In the 1939

Register Jesse Sly was described as "*GPO postmaster and postman*". Jesse Sly died in 1946. Lizzie Sly and her daughter Nora continued to live in Cowley until her death in 1973.


Positive things you could do in February....

Make St Valentine's Day memorable - give a book!

International Book Giving Day, on 14th February, is about getting books into the hands of as many children as possible. The idea was started in 2012 and is now run entirely by volunteers in 44 countries. In the UK it is organised by Emma Perry of *My Book Corner*, <u>emperry@gmail.com</u>. According to the National Literacy Trust, in 2012 only one in every eight children in the UK owned a book and today generally literacy remains much lower than most of us would expect. The Covid lockdowns have slightly boosted the amount of reading children have been doing, although much of this is not always with printed books - online activities and games were a prime source.

Perhaps one of the most important comments the Literacy Trust's latest report, published last year, made is that: 'Some children and young people reported that a lack of access to books (with schools and libraries closed), a lack of quiet space at home and a lack of school/peer support had negatively affected their ability to read and their motivation to read for enjoyment'.

As this is being written, the Covid pandemic is ongoing and restrictions on people's lives continue to be made around the world. Getting books into the hands of children remains, therefore, as important as ever. To

Thinking of others: Fairtrade Fortnight February 2022

This year's Fairtrade Fortnight is from 21st February to 6th March.

Fairtrade works with farming co-operatives, businesses, and governments to make trade fair so that producers earn secure and sustainable livelihoods. (Learn to do right; seek justice. Defend the oppressed *Isaiah 1:17* and, Love your neighbour as yourself *Matthew 22:39*).

The climate crisis is the biggest threat to the livelihoods of millions of small-scale farmers and agricultural workers in low-income countries worldwide. Without a fairer income, farmers and workers are unable to invest in the types of mitigation and adaptation techniques needed to protect the environment, and their businesses. This represents a vicious cycle of poverty in which steps towards environmental protection and decarbonisation are likely to be beyond the reach of those who aren't even able to earn a living income because the price they receive for their produce is far too low.

When thinking of *Fairtrade*, most people think of bananas, chocolate or tea and coffee, but there are many other *Fairtrade* products, including gold, wine, clothes, beauty products and flowers. There are over 70,000 people growing, harvesting, packing, and caring

for *Fairtrade* flowers which are traceable to the original farm. *Fairtrade* certified farms must ensure safety and working conditions for their employees. These farms receive a *Fairtrade* Premium of 10% for every item sold, which allows workers to invest in healthcare, education and other social benefits.

Fairtrade works with flower workers in countries including Kenya, Ethiopia, Sri Lanka, Ecuador, Uganda and Tanzania. *Fairtrade* flowers are available from *Aldi, Asda, Co-op, Lidl, M & S* and *Moonpig*, which may be worth bearing in mind with the approach of Valentine's Day and then Mothering Sunday on 27th March!

Citizens Advice - on Claiming your State Pension

Don't forget to claim your State Pension!

In years past you would have received your State Retirement Pension automatically. You may not be aware, but this is no longer the case, so you will have to claim it to receive it! At Citizens Advice, we have been contacted by an increasing number of people who did not realise this situation.



You should get a letter from **the Pension Service** no later than 2 months before your 66th birthday (which is the current State Pension Age) telling you what to do to claim your pension. If you do not receive this letter, you can still make a claim in the 4 months up to reaching your state pension age.

It is important to claim your State Pension as soon as you can, as there may be delays in payment if you leave claiming it too close to your 66th birthday, which could lead to financial difficulties for some people.

How to claim - The quickest way to get your State Pension is to apply online at <u>www.gov.uk/get-state-pension</u> but if you don't have access to the internet you can request a form by calling **the Pension Service on 0800 731 7898.**

You can check your State Pension age online at <u>www.gov.uk/state-pension-age</u> or get a forecast of how much money you might get at <u>www.gov.uk/check-state-pension</u>

News from our NHS Trust - Anne Davies

This month I am relating how NHS problems in the news are currently manifesting in the Trust.

Around two thirds of the COVID patients in hospital were admitted for reasons other than COVID which only showed on subsequent testing. COVID positive patients are generally younger with 53% under 60 years compared to 36% in wave 1 and are less likely to have had their booster. They experience milder disease, require less intervention, and go home much earlier than in previous waves. Of great support to the staff has been some especially heart-warming compliments from patients and families cared for in the recent weeks.

'Critical incidents' indicate a time of concern which is serious but not major for the whole system and refer to changes in management of the hospitals at the busiest times. They normally last for 2-3 days but recently one lasted for nine days. They are linked to excess patient numbers and staff and bed shortages. A contributing factor is a continuing high number of patients awaiting discharge. Whilst normally around 100, this figure recently reached 205. It was 150 at Christmas when it would normally be 30-40. Another contributing factor has been the loss of about 60 beds to ensure the necessary separation of patients to inhibit the spread of COVID. Ambulance waiting times are also seriously impacted by the shortage of beds.

Finally, to end with good news, Professor Steve Hams, the trust Chief Nurse, was awarded an MBE in the New Year's Honours for services to the NHS and nursing. He introduced to the Trust an internationally acclaimed Nursing and Midwifery excellence programme, which promotes innovation and improvement and places emphasis on shared decision-making and collective leadership. He also showed extraordinary leadership as Gloucestershire's Senior Responsible Officer for the COVID-19 vaccination programme.
