# Pastoral Letter - Revd Dr Janet Anderson-Mackenzie

As Spring is almost sprung, despite the cold weather we have snowdrops, daffodils and budding trees. You might expect the vicar to start talking about new life and things like that, but this month I actually find myself thinking about grief.

Several of my friends have friends and family who have died recently, and I find myself reflecting on how the twelve years since my mother died have passed so quickly and so slowly at the same time.

Not long after my mother died, a matter of weeks, my Dad (who was estranged from my Mum for many years) asked me if I was over her death. He got quite a short answer from me that it wasn't like that. He asked what he could do to make things easier, I asked him to sort through his belongings and get rid of the junk. He didn't. When he died in 2016 it took my eldest brother hundreds of hours to sort through my Dad's belongings, which began with a fortnight's search, all day, every day, for Dad's will.

In the past few days I have been speaking to the son of a recently deceased hoarder. I was able to sympathise with true empathy.

I was at a talk once where someone quoted Dr Jonas Salk: "Our greatest responsibility is to be good ancestors." I was really struck by that. What do we want to be our legacy? Memories of hours spent trawling through things? Or instead memories of time well spent, investment in the future generations and so on.

We have our responsibilities. One of my hopes in not to emulate my parents in their acquisition of stuff,



but instead to clear things out, even if that means probably starting now to clear things away.

This Spring as we move through Lent towards Easter we hold these two things in our hands, grief and hope. They are important things, and we must balance them in our own lives. When we get to Easter the Christians celebrate that there is new hope in Jesus, new life and joy that Jesus has the power over death. This might make Jesus seem like a superhero, but we remember that the fully human Jesus also wept with those mourning the death of their friend.

When we lived in Wellington I led two funeral services a week and I had to think about the theological puzzle of life and death. Christians believe that each human is created as an individual eternal being. We believe that God places us on earth for only a short time, it must be important, or why would he bother?

Perhaps this little quote has a clue:

'Grief never ends, but it changes, it's a passage, not a place to stay. Grief is not a sign of weakness, nor lack of faith...it is the price of love'.

They are autistic and we have
to battle to get the support they
need. This has been a long,
exhausting and at times lonely
journey. As we've got to know
other special needs parents,
we've discovered just how
many parents are struggling.
Many are completely
overwhelmed and burnt out.



Using our personal and professional experiences we are seeking to bring hope and change by:

- Supporting parents to advocate for their children, and navigate the complex health, social care and education system. One parent recently said to Faith 'you have told me more in 1 hour, than school have in 6 years'.
- Advising schools on becoming more inclusive through
   Occupational Therapy consultation and Faith's book '<u>Inclusive PE</u> for SEND Children' that was published this year
- Trying to make church more inclusive for neurodivergent families as we have also found it difficult to find a church community that is accessible to us all – one that isn't too noisy, but is friendly and happy to have kids running around, making noise and eating crisps!
- Providing space for families who don't attend church to explore Christian spirituality

We can do all this because churches like yours support us financially.





## Citizens' Advice - on debt problems



I've built up a bit of debt and I am panicking. Even though I cut back, Christmas was expensive, my spending has gone up and what I have coming in just doesn't stretch as far as it used to. What can I do?

First of all it's important to know you're not alone in finding things difficult and, crucially, there is support available.

The first step is to collect all the information you have about your **debts**; this might include contracts, bills and statements.

Next, make a list of your debts and write down the details of each.

This could include who you owe the money to (this person or company is your 'creditor'); when you first missed a payment; and how much you now owe. You'll also need to make a note of your account or reference number and what steps the creditor has taken to get the money back, e.g. sending you letters.

It might feel overwhelming when you see all of your debts written down but try not to worry, the important thing is that you are sorting them out.

If you are behind on household bills, prioritise paying your rent or mortgage, plus energy bills and Council Tax first. Not paying these bills has the most serious consequences. You should speak to the person or company you owe money to, to see if there are any manageable steps you can take to start reducing your debt.


Once you've got these debts under control, you should look at any other debts like credit card or store card debts, payday loans or missed Buy Now Pay Later payments.

While you are looking at money going out, do remember to consider money that could be coming in. It's always worth checking if there are any benefits that you are entitled to, including support with your energy and living costs. There's a benefits calculator, advice on how to reduce living costs and information on other ways to increase your income, plus further advice on dealing with debts, on the Citizens Advice website – <a href="https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk">www.citizensadvice.org.uk</a>

There is also emergency support that you may be able to access, such as a food bank or fuel vouchers. You could also contact your local council to see if they can offer support.

We know that times are incredibly tough but please remember, you don't have to face this alone. 



# What do hedgehogs, nesting birds and polar bears have in common?

#### **Answer:** They are all celebrated during February!

### **HEDGEHOG DAY: 2<sup>nd</sup> February:**

The earliest traceable practice of the belief that hedgehogs can predict the coming of spring goes back to the Ancient Romans, who relied on them - not groundhogs which are a completely different creature - to determine if



spring was coming soon. Later, Germans did a similar thing with local <u>badgers</u>, while in America groundhogs offer a similar prediction. Hedgehogs are definitely a gardener's friend, because they eat beetles, caterpillars, worms and other invertebrates you might not want. They also help to keep your crops and plants in great health. You can encourage hedgehogs into your garden and keep them and your garden happy throughout the year.

**NEST BOX WEEK – 14<sup>th</sup> - 21<sup>st</sup> February:** Organised by the *British Trust for Ornithology*. National Nest Box Week encourages people to help the birds by putting up nest boxes. With the nesting season about to start, garden birds will be starting to prepare for their busiest time of year. The main nesting season runs from March to August but, rather aptly, birds are traditionally thought to have paired up by Valentine's Day, 14<sup>th</sup> February, hence the start of Nest Box Week. As well as feeding birds, the Trust says that it is important they have a suitable shelter and site for breeding. With natural habitats such as trees and hedgerows being lost to development and the increase in urban housing, some garden birds can struggle to find a safe shelter to rear their young, hence providing a nest box in your garden can be a positive benefit.

#### WORLD POLAR BEAR DAY-

17<sup>th</sup> February: This day was founded to coincide with the time when polar bear mothers and cubs are snug in their dens. This year the focus is on raising funds to help protect mother and cub polar bears, giving them the best possible chance of survival. On



average, only about half of all cubs reach adulthood, with even lower survival rates in the most vulnerable populations. This is what the <a href="WWF">WWF</a> (World Wide Fund for Nature) says: 'While climate change remains the greatest threat to the polar bear's survival, that is not all that the predator is up against. The oil and gas industry is turning its eyes to the arctic, and with it comes the potential risks of habitat destruction from oil exploration work. Contact with oil spills can reduce the insulating effect of a bear's fur requiring them to use more energy to get warm and can poison them if ingested. Polar bears can also be exposed to toxic chemicals such as pesticides through their prey, which can affect a bear's biological functioning and ability to reproduce. Melting sea ice from climate change has increased human-polar bear conflicts when hungry polar bears search for food in the summer. Fortunately, people are learning to adapt to the polar bear's presence and to take preventative measures to reduce the risk of conflict.'
